



This award is named after UM sociologist Mark V. Frezzo, a scholar of human rights and "the right to science" as defined in Article 27 in the <u>Universal</u> <u>Declaration of Human Rights.</u> He was loved and respected by students and colleagues for his dedication to his field, his mentorship, and his institution-building efforts. The one-year award will be given to a sociology major who demonstrates a passion for human rights (civil, political, economic, social, or cultural rights, including the right to science) and social justice.

What does the award consist of?

- \$1,100 a year
- Mentorship from a sociology faculty on an academic or servicelearning project related to human rights and social justice
- A short presentation of your work at the end of the year

Who is eligible?

- Current sociology majors or students willing to declare sociology as their major
- Minimum of 3.0 GPA
- First preference is for students with financial need (as determined by FAFSA on file with UM Office of Financial Aid)
